













TOUGH



Felicia Senter of EWI of Tulsa, energized the afternoon with, "On Your Mark, Get Set, Go EWI!!" She helped us prepare an elevator speech to share with others about our WHY about EWI.

We met back together for a continuation of Kim Becking sharing how to "Reimagine and Build a Momentum Mindset: How to Slay Your Inner Bully, Boost You Confidence and Reimagine What's Possible." She shared personal stories about her challenges—from divorce to breast cancer and all the craziness in between. She shared how she slayed her inner bully, "Edna", a guidance counselor who told her she wasn't "college material." Boy did she show her! After having to wait an additional year to get to LCAM in Albuquerque, it certainly didn't disappoint. We started our visit to Albuquerque with a few shenanigans (well, not really), but we sure had a lot of laughs. Day 2 started bright and early at 7am as we did each day. This morning began with the BCDP Celebration and Literacy Brunch. We got to hear from the Principal and Vice Principal from a local Title I elementary school in Albuquerque who were so excited and enthusiastic about the difference EWI of Albuquerque has made for their schools, and in particular their second-grade students. The chapter put together a fantastic video, that included players from the University of New Mexico Baseball Team, who read stories to children. They donated books and a bag of school supplies. Additionally, the Lucille Johnson Perkins Award Winners were announced.










Stunning Interactive Art Installation Now on Display at Main Street Garden; Immersive Piece, Passage, is Free and Open to the Public for Six Weeks



Passage, an immersive, interactive art installation, is now open at Downtown's Main Street Garden, 1902 Main St., for a six-week run expected to draw thousands of residents and visitors to the heart of Dallas.

Downtown Dallas, Inc. (DDI) has been working since 2019 to bring the Montreal-based artwork to the city. The timeline was delayed due to the pandemic. This is the only time the piece has been in Texas and just the fourth time it has been displayed in a U.S. city.

Passage is a minimalist, contemplative, and immersive artwork that explores the emotional connections we develop with light and sound. The concept of the artwork takes root in the definition of the word passage itself: the act of moving through or past something on the way from one place to another, and the process of transition from one state to another in a temporal dimension.

"Public art activations in the heart of Downtown are key to our strategy of keeping our parks and public spaces vibrant, active, and safe for all," said Kourtny Garrett, DDI president and CEO. "It has been invigorating to see so many people returning to Downtown this summer and we hope this installation will serve as the backdrop for many more family-friendly gatherings in our City Center throughout the fall."

The installation consists of 20 circles of light that form a tunnel, which bystanders can walk through. The passage through the tunnel activates light animations and sounds. Each configuration has its own ambiance.

The creator of Passage, Serge Maheu, describes Passage as a personal and sensory experience that remains playful.

"The city of Dallas has a rising international profile as a place that is welcoming to art and artists of all backgrounds," Maheu said. "I am so excited for my work to have a temporary home in Downtown Dallas."

The exhibit will serve as a centerpiece to a series of free events in and around Main Street Garden in the coming weeks, including DDI's Discover Downtown Movie Series, Market Mile, Art at the Park, and a pop-up Beer Garden. For a complete listing of events, visit DowntownDallas.com/events.

Passage launches as another immersive exhibit, the <u>Immersive Van Gogh</u>, continues to draw thousands of visitors to the nearby East Quarter neighborhood of Downtown. Downtown Dallas is also the home of AURORA, Dallas Art Fair, Nasher Public, and numerous Dallas Arts Month events.

The installation, sponsored by VisitDallas, is free and open to the public. It will be at Main Street Garden through Wednesday, November 3.

'Set Boundaries, Find Peace'

In her new book by the same name, therapist, content creator and author Nedra Glover Tawwab reveals why boundaries are key to feeling calm.

Are you feeling unhappy, overwhelmed or resentful about certain parts of your life — like your relationships, work or other responsibilities? Or maybe you haven't taken time for self-care lately or feel guilty if you do.


You may struggle with setting boundaries.

"People can't meet a standard that we never express," writes therapist and content creator Nedra Glover Tawwab in her new book, Set Boundaries, Find Peace.
As her book opens, Tawwab reveals that boundary issues can be disguised as other problems. But that setting boundaries can set us free.

Whew. Being set free. What would that feel like for you? Probably pretty good.

But before you freely feel the breeze, understand what boundaries are. Are we talking about building fences around our hearts or shutting out people in our lives? Not necessarily. (Though you may find, after you set standards, that some situations are no longer a match.)

In psychology, a boundary is simply a limit we set to protect our integrity, with this then helping us to set realistic limits on relationships or activities, the American Psychological Association notes.



Practically speaking, boundaries can be as simple as not allowing people to smoke in your home, as Tawwab discovered she could request of her mother, noting you will be unavailable to work overtime or simply saying no to requests that aren't in line with your goals or that feel uncomfortable. And yes, that can include skipping family or social events that feel draining or unhealthy — sorry Aunt Sarah — or declining requests to lend money to friends. Saying no is not selfish in these cases. Saying no helps protect you.

Continued - 'Set Boundaries, Find Peace'


If you're wondering if creating boundaries could help you, Tawwab reveals when it might. Here are signs you need boundaries, according to Tawwab:

- You feel overwhelmed.
- You feel resentment toward people for asking for your help.
- You avoid phone calls and interactions with people you think might ask for something.
- You make comments about helping people but getting nothing in return.
- You feel burned out.
- You frequently daydream about dropping everything and running away.
- You have no time for yourself.

That's a *list*. But one reason we don't set boundaries is that we can be afraid of how others will react. Or we can feel guilty for prioritizing our needs.

"It isn't easy to set limits, especially with the people we love. It may seem far worse to risk making someone mad than to have an uncomfortable conversation," Tawwab writes. "[But] people don't know what you want. It's your job to make it clear. Clarity saves relationships."

It's also important to know what to do if people don't respect your boundaries. And how to communicate your preferences effectively. Of course, people should immediately respect your standards, especially when it comes to your body and personal preferences for health and safety. But some issues may require us to do more than simply state a boundary, as Tawwab confirms. Action can be required in addition to holding people accountable.



When we create healthy boundaries, however, it can lead to feeling "safe, loved, calm, and respected," Tawwab explains.

So how do you set these standards? Tawwab, who also helps people create healthy relationships via her <u>informational and inspirational posts on Instagram</u>, where she has more than 850,000 followers, outlines specific and actionable tips in her new book.
