

The year was 1951 and Dallas' population was 434,000. The city's first expressway had just been built – The Central Expressway. It was in the summer that National Officers of Executives' Secretaries, Inc. (ESI) began considering a Texas chapter. This organization sought to bring together the highest-ranking women in corporations. At that time, these positions were usually the secretaries of the CEO's. After a few preliminary inquiries, Katherine Marshall of the Los Angeles Chapter contacted her brother, Louis Egan, an independent oil operator in Dallas. Mr. Egan was quick to become interested in the organization; and he, in turn, relayed his enthusiasm to his secretary, Lou Ballou.

Through correspondence with National Officers, Lou learned more about Executives' Secretaries and, with the help of Elva Patterson of Firestone Tire & Rubber Company, other firms in the city were contacted. In July, Katherine Marshall visited Dallas and held a meeting with the interested group and some of the officers of the new chapter were elected. A final meeting was held in the fall and the remaining officers and directors were elected to complete the Board.

The charter dinner for the Dallas Chapter, the ninth chapter of ESI, was held exactly 70 years ago on December 14, 1951, at the Adolphus Hotel. **National Director Corris Guy presided** as Mistress of Ceremonies and Ruby Sorber, National President of the Las Vegas Chapter, Doris Otto of the Los Angeles Chapter, and Mr. A. E. Chalan of the Las Vegas Review Journal, participated in the program and told the group what ESI means to the secretary, the firm and the community. Lou Ballou was installed as the first Dallas President. And so the second ESI chapter outside the state of California was gloriously welcomed into the organization with twenty-two charter member firms and representatives. By the end of the next year, there were 38 member firms.

THE CHARTER DINNER

December 14, 1951 - Aldophus Hotel



In the audience of that first Installation dinner in 1951 was young Dorothy Vaughan, a secretary at Dr Pepper Co. Louis Egan had contacted Leonard Green, President of Dr Pepper, who had agreed to join ESI as a charter member. However, Mr. Green's secretary at the time was male. Instead of sending the secretary of a VP, Mr. Green asked Dorothy, who filled in for his secretary, to go the meeting and see what it was all about. Little did he or Dorothy realize the impact of that request!

Dorothy Vaughan went on to become his permanent long-time secretary and served as Dallas President in 1954 and 1955 and as National President of ESI in 1957-58. She was an active representative until her retirement in 1988 from Leonard Green Investments and today she remains a Corporate Life member in EWI. Dorothy Vaughan is our Living Legend. She could not attend the 70th Anniversary Dinner as she is very active in her retirement community and was already booked for the evening.
